

RESOLUTION 18-03-685**A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE "ZONING RESOLUTION OF ANDERSON COUNTY, TENNESSEE" BY THE ADDITION OF PERFORMANCE STANDARDS FOR SELF-STORAGE FACILITIES**

WHEREAS, the Anderson County Board of Commissioners, in accordance with Section 13-7-105 of the Tennessee Code Annotated, may amend the zoning "Zoning Resolution of Anderson County, Tennessee"; and

WHEREAS, the Anderson County Regional Planning Commission and the Clinton Municipal/Regional Planning Commission have reviewed and made recommendations regarding the proposed amendment of the "Zoning Resolution of Anderson County, Tennessee", in accordance with Section 13-7-105(a) of the Tennessee Code Annotated; and

WHEREAS, public notice has been provided in a newspaper of general circulation for the public hearing to be held by the Anderson County Board of Commissioners to consider such zoning amendment of the "Zoning Resolution of Anderson County, Tennessee," with a complete summary of such amendment, in accordance with Section 13-7-105(b) of the Tennessee Code Annotated; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Anderson County, Tennessee:

Section 1. Division 45, Special Provisions of Article 3, is hereby amended by the addition of a new Section 045-180, Self-Storage Facilities as follows:

Section 045-180. Development Standards for Self-Storage Facilities. The following development standards and requirements shall apply to all proposed self-storage facilities to be located in the unincorporated portions of Anderson County, Tennessee. It is the intent of this section to allow for the establishment of self-storage facilities that are designed to maximize operational efficiency, compatibility with surrounding properties, and the community as a whole. The following standards shall apply to all self-storage facilities:

1. Minimum Lot Size shall be 40,000 square feet.
2. A site plan shall be submitted the planning commission for approval.
3. No self-storage facility shall exceed the maximum height limitations of the applicable district.
4. Internal lanes shall be at least twenty-four (24) feet wide when storage cubicles open onto one side of the lane only and at least thirty (30) feet wide when cubicles open onto both sides of the lane.
5. A minimum of four (4) parking spaces are required unless the planning commission determines the need for additional parking.
6. Except for the sale or auction of items foreclosed upon by the owner of the facility, the sale or auction of items is prohibited.
7. The storage of flammable liquids, highly combustible or explosive materials, or hazardous chemicals is specifically prohibited and all rental contracts shall include clauses prohibiting such storage.
8. The servicing or repair of motor vehicles, boats, trailers, lawnmowers or any similar equipment is specifically prohibited.
9. Tow Trailers, recreational vehicles, boats and all operational vehicles may be stored outside in designated areas only. All other storage must be within enclosed structures.
10. A fenced or planted buffer strip, at least eight (8) feet high, shall be provided along all perimeter lot lines abutting property zoned or used for residential purposes.
11. Perimeter fencing is required along the perimeter of the facility.

12. The site plan shall contain a lighting plan. All lighting shall be oriented onto the site and away from adjacent property.
13. The establishment of a transfer and storage business or other businesses within the facility are prohibited.
14. Fire protection shall be provided in compliance with the applicable Fire Code.
15. Signs are permitted in accordance with Division 065 of the zoning resolution.







**RESOLUTION TO URGE THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO SUPPORT SB 2509/HB 1958
ALLOWING LOCAL REGISTERS OF DEEDS THE LEGAL ABILITY TO RETAIN
FIVE PERCENT (5%) FOR THE COLLECTION OF STATE TAXES ON RECORDINGS**

WHEREAS, the registers of deeds were entitled to retain a five percent (5%) commission for collecting state taxes levied under T.C.A. § 67-4-409 prior to 2006; and

WHEREAS, in 2006, T.C.A. § 67-4-409 was amended by Public Chapter 989 to provide that fifty-two percent (52%) of the registers' commission was to be retained by the state and credited to the state general fund; and


WHEREAS, SB 2509/HB 1958 would restore the entire five percent (5%) commission to the registers of deeds.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Anderson County, meeting in regular session on this 19th day of March, 2018, that we urge the Tennessee General Assembly to support this legislation restoring the full five percent (5%) commission to the registers of deeds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the county clerk shall mail certified copies of this resolution to the members of the Tennessee General Assembly representing the people of Anderson County and send a copy to executive director of the County Officials Association of Tennessee.

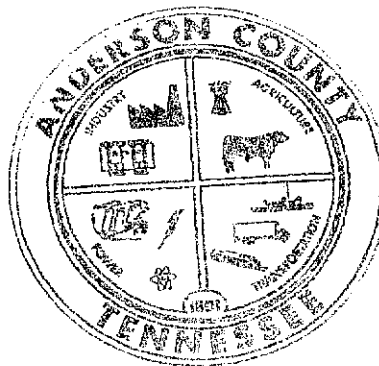

Of his many evidence-based solutions, the creation of the County's Alternative to Incarceration Program was born. This program alone has firmly demonstrated that the warehousing of prisoners is not an efficient, economical or humane solution and that all people need a second chance at life to correct the wrongs of improper influences and pay back their debt to society. Today, this program stands atop as a model program across the state and this nation for all jurisdictions to replicate and implement; and

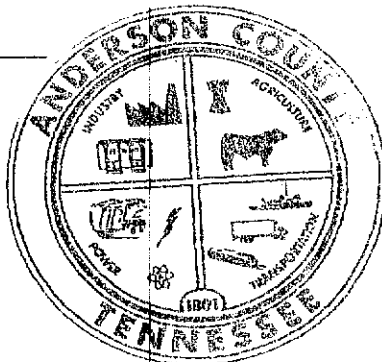

**RESOLUTION HONORING SHELTER ANIMALS RESCUE GROUP
"SARG"**

WHEREAS, SARG is a non-profit organization with a steadfast mission to give Anderson County's homeless animals a second chance at life by placing these animals into loving, caring and responsible homes; and

WHEREAS, the efforts of SARG have dramatically reduced the County's population of stray and unwanted animals by placing over one thousand (1000) animals in new homes and sponsoring monthly spay, neuter and vaccinations clinics free of charge to low-income families and Anderson County animal shelters; and

WHEREAS, in the past six (6) years SARG has donated: over \$30,000 to area residents for emergency medical procedures; \$20,800 for the purchase of a shelter transport van to take animals to shelters in the northern United States and other pet adoption centers; \$5,000 to Anderson County for the building of a much-needed animal shelter; \$11,000 to Oak Ridge Animal Shelter for greatly needed improvements; along with several thousand pounds of pet food to low-income senior citizens; and

WHEREAS, in 2017 alone SARG paid for over 150 animals to be spayed or neutered; and

WHEREAS, without the assistance of SARG the vision of a viable Anderson County Animal Shelter would have never come to fruition.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Anderson County Board of Commissioners meeting in regular session this 19th day of March, 2018 that we officially commend and honor the heroic efforts of SARG and its dedicated group of volunteers in reducing the homeless animal population in our County and in doing so, recognize their efforts that have made Anderson County a better place to live and work for all our citizens.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we declare the entire month of April 2018 to be:

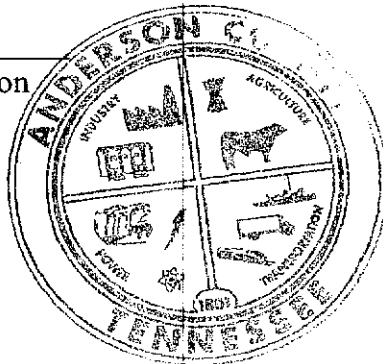
"Animal Awareness Month in Anderson County"

WHEREAS, the Tennessee General Assembly is responsible for providing funding for the medical services of inmates housed in state prisons, and;


WHEREAS, the cost of medical services for inmates has dynamically increased over the last few years with such costs increasing much faster than the tax base to support the funding of such costs, and;


WHEREAS, enacting legislation to establish Medicaid/TennCare rates as the maximum chargeable amount for medical services provided to inmates helps to insure inmates housed in county jails and/or state prisons continue to receive appropriate medical care during their period of incarceration while simultaneously providing some financial relief to counties and the State of Tennessee in the funding of such coats, and;
